

## Calculating the Graduation and Dropout Rates of Students with Disabilities

The Michigan Department of Education, Office of Special Education and Early Intervention Services (OSE-EIS) is required to report to the public the graduation rates and dropout rates of students with disabilities for each school district in Michigan. Data used to calculate graduation and dropout rates are derived from the Single Record Student Database (SRSD), maintained by the Center for Performance and Information (CEPI). As students with disabilities leave their school district, school district personnel report in the SRSD the exit status of each student (e.g., graduated, dropped out, moving to a new district, etc).

The following explanation describes how students with disabilities are recorded and tracked in the SRSD. Formulas used to calculate graduation and dropout rates are also presented. Due to different reporting requirements mandated by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP), it is necessary to perform a crosswalk of some exit codes used in the SRSD.

### How are graduation and dropout rates computed?

Michigan is currently using two methods to calculate graduation. An OSEP approved methodology is used to calculate graduation and dropout rates for students with disabilities. The following OSEP approved formulas are:

#### Graduation Rate =

$$\frac{\# \text{ Graduated with a high school diploma}}{\# \text{ Graduated with a high school diploma} + \# \text{ Received a certificate/GED} + \# \text{ Dropped out} + \# \text{ Aged out} + \# \text{ Deceased}}$$

This number is then multiplied by 100.

#### Dropout Rate =

$$\frac{\# \text{ Dropped Out}}{\# \text{ Graduated with a HS diploma} + \# \text{ Received a certificate/GED} + \# \text{ Dropped out} + \# \text{ Aged out} + \# \text{ Deceased}}$$

This number is then multiplied by 100.

Please note: Michigan serves students with disabilities through age 25. The OSEP formula reflects students through age 21. So the category "Aged Out" is zero (0) in Michigan. Graduation and dropout rates using the cohort method are available.

### How are SRSD exit data used to capture accurately all students with disabilities who exited during the 2007-2008 school year?

The following steps were followed to record students with disabilities who exited special education programs and/or services during the 2007-2008 school year. Students with disabilities were identified as exiting special education or exiting their school district from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008.

1. Data on students with disabilities who were reported in the SRSD for the entire 2007-2008 school year were isolated into a special education database. This database contained a record of students with disabilities for the fall 2007, spring 2008, and End Of Year 2008 data submission periods.

2. Students with disabilities who exited special education programs/services between July 1, 2007 and June 30, 2008 were recorded as exiting special education.
3. Those students with disabilities who exited the school district, who had no exit data from special education were also identified and recorded as exited students.
4. Steps 2 and 3 were used to derive a list of all students with disabilities who exited special education during the 2007-08 school year.
5. The OSE-EIS is only able to capture those students with disabilities who were reported as exiting special education if school district personnel accurately reported this information in the students' SRSD record. If district personnel exited students with disabilities from the district, but failed to put this information in the students' SRSD record, the OSE-EIS would be unable to report the exit information for those students with disabilities.

**How are SRSD exit categories aligned with the OSEP exit categories?**

The OSEP requires States to track and report on students with disabilities who exited special education. Michigan must report in seven (7) exit categories. These categories include:

1. Graduated with a high school diploma
2. Dropped out of school
3. Enrolled in another district (i.e., moved to another district)
4. Died
5. Received a special education certificate of completion
6. Reached the maximum age for receiving special education programs/services (not applicable in Michigan)
7. Declassified - returned to general education

The SRSD allows district personnel to report 22 different exit reasons. Because the SRSD has more exit categories than OSEP allows, the MDE must assign exit categories to the federal OSEP categories. The chart below provides the alignment between federal OSEP exit categories and SRSD exit categories.

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<sup>1</sup> For example, SRSD exit categories 5, 7, 10, 11, 16, and 18 are combined to determine the total number of students with disabilities aged 14 – 21 who dropped out of school.
